

THE YEAR IN QUESTION 1895 TUESDAY 16 SEPTEMBER OR FRIDAY 26 SEPTEMBER

The rise of the "new woman" in education, journalism, medicine, mountain climbing, literature, art; Anita Augspurg collaborates with newspaper, Die Frauenbewegung, National Trust is founded by Octavia Hill, Gertrude Stein works with William James at newly housed women's college, 'The Harvard Annex'; the Dreyfus affair bursts on France and The American Jewess is published in US; the debate between science and religion is highlit as Louis Pasteur dies, Diesel patents his engine, and X-rays are discovered; HG Wells' The Time Machine, Hardy's Jude the Obscure, Kipling's If, Nietzsche's Anti-Christ are published; London School of Economics is founded; Saturday Review hires George Bernard Shaw and Max Beerbohm as drama critics, Oscar Wilde's The Ideal Husband and The Importance of Being Earnest premiere and their playwright is imprisoned, Owen Hall's record-breaking musical, An Artist's Model, opens at Day Theatre; George Joy paints Bayswater Omnibus, Munch The Scream and Jealousy, Cezanne, Monet, Lautrec, Degas and Klimt reach heights; Brahms' Clarinet Sonata Op. 120, Debussy Prélude a L'Après-Midi d'Un Faune, Mahler's Resurrection Symphony premiere, Henry Wood conducts first Promenade concert at Queen's Hall, America the Beautiful is published, The Band Played On and The Sidewalks of New York are recorded, Australian soprano Ada Crossley debuts at London's Queen's Hall; modern cinema is born as Robert W. Paul and Birt Acres create the Kineopticon, the first working 35 mm movie camera, and Lumière brothers create the camera Cinématographe.
