The Midland Hotel is a Grade II listed building and four-star hotel. It is one of Manchester's most cherished architectural icons. It opened in 1903 and was originally built to serve rail travellers arriving from London and so it is located minutes from Piccadilly station. It offers outstanding customer service, as well as two critically acclaimed fine dining restaurants, a decadent lounge bar and a quintessentially British tea room overlooking St Peter's Square, as well as a luxury spa with heated relaxation pool and steam room. Under the skill of Manchester's own Adam Reid, The French has received 4AA Rosettes and been named one of the top 15 restaurants in the UK. The menu is changed daily, with each dish incorporating fresh, locally sourced produce.
