

IN QUESTION SELF-PORTRAITURE IN QUESTION

Riddled with contradictions, complexities and conundrums, the self-portrait raises more questions than almost any other topic in painting. Are self-portraits so numerous just because the model is there for free? What image does the artist want to project of him or herself? Is it a realist, critical, or fantasist image? How is the actual business of painting a self-portrait affected by being painted from a reflection in a mirror? Van Dyck presented himself with a sunflower; Rembrandt as laughing; Murillo with an address to his sons; Judith Leyster in the act of painting a violinist; Sofonisba Anguissola while playing a clavichord, Courbet and Gauguin in numerous roles as if they were actors; Van Gogh with clashing colours which seem to represent the torments of his mind; Gwen John with an enforced stillness; Munch surrounded by a mysterious miasma; Picasso glaring at himself; Frida Kahlo using the medium to express her physical anguish; Freud to investigate every vein and patch of his face. In looking at self-portraits, we reconsider our own images of ourselves, and the question of how we want to be seen by others.
