## SPOKES IN A WHEEL MARBLE ARCH

Five TUESDAY Mornings 5 May & 19 May, 2 June & 16 June, 30 June

Marble Arch was originally designed by John Nash in 1827 as a grand entrance to Buckingham Palace. In 1851 it was relocated to the top of Park Lane, where it now forms the hub of a varied group of streets. Baywater Road is remarkable for its Italian Garden and Tyburn convent; Edgware Road for its Roman History and its Lebanese present which gives it the name of 'Little Beirut'. Great Cumberland Place and Seymour Place on the Portman Estate are remarkable for their residents and for West London Synagogue; Oxford Street for the grandeur of Selfridges; and Park Lane for palatial residences and hotels.

Tuesday 2 June Great Cumberland Place: Please meet outside Maryleybone Underground station.

Tuesday 30 June Park Lane: Please meet outside Apsley House on Hyde Park Corner.

Please meet at 11.00 at the underground station indicated. Each morning ends at 1.00 with optional lunch near Marble Arch. £70 per morning members, £75 non-members.
